Council considers if and how pool may re-open

At a meeting held on June 8, the Northwood City Council learned more about how the pool would run, if the City open it this year.

At the time of the meeting, pools were not open to general swimming in Iowa. That changed on Friday.

Pool manager Heather Rheingans was at the meeting to talk about guidelines for operating pools amidst concerns of COVID-19.

Rheingans had taken part in training and had researched the guidelines set by the CDC and professional pool organizations.

Rheingans said that it is recommended that people should wear masks outside of the water, that social distance be maintained in and out of the water and that other hygiene procedures be undertaken.

As to pool equipment and furniture, Rheingans noted that it would have to be cleaned and sanitized after each use, which would be difficult for the slides, kickboards, pool noodles, chairs and tables. It was suggested that, if insurance allows, those coming to the pool could bring their own chairs instead, or use towels for seating outside of the pool.

Restrooms would also have to be sanitized frequently, but

Worth parks closed amidst safety concerns

Kuennen's Quarry and Worth County Lake have been closed, after excessive crowds and unsafe activities led to considerable safety and COVID-19 concerns for Worth County officials.

At Monday's meeting of the Worth County Board of supervisors, county officials shared that five times more than normal people were visiting the park on a daily basis, and a year's worth of law enforcement calls had happened since the park reopened in late May.

Those excessive visitors brought COVID-19 concerns beyond CDC guidelines, in addition to other unsafe and illegal activity, leading officials from

Additional COVID-19 case confirmed in Worth

An additional case of COVID-19 has been confirmed in a Worth County resident.

As of June 12, an additional COVID-19 case has been confirmed, in an individual in the 41-60 age range.

This marks the fourth Worth County resident to be confirmed with the virus.

The previous three cases were in the 18-40 and 41-60 age ranges. All three are listed as recovered.

As of press time on Monday, 397 Worth County residents had been tested for COVID-19.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include cough, fever (100.4 or greater) and shortness of breath. Anyone experiencing any of these symptoms, should call their health care provider before going into the office. The provider may have special instructions and will determine if they should be tested.

Those with symptoms, or who may be interested in being tested can take an assessment and get more information at testiowa.com.

Health officials continue to remind people to take preventive measures to slow the spread of this virus. It is important for everyone to practice social distancing.

NVFC fans flames for barbecue, while foregoing annual raffle

One of the Fourth of July traditions each year is the annual Northwood Volunteer Fire Company raffle. However, COVID-19 concerns have made that impractical this year. Instead, the local firefighters are barbecuing, and offering the meal to the community for donations. The barbecue will be held this Saturday, June 20, from 4:30-7:30 p.m. at the fire station.

According to NVFC chief Mitch Hanson, in other years, the department would contact local businesses for donations, to be used to gather prizes for the raffle.

However, members of the department decided not to ask for donations when businesses have seen an economic hit from virus restrictions.

Another concern was the less than socially distant contact involved in the selling of raffle tickets.

Social distancing and limiting contact is something that the department is also looking at for the fall, as they will be encouraging more mail in donations during their annual drive, to cut back on the door-to-door calls.

Calling off the Fourth of July raffle wasn't an easy decision for the department. As Hanson noted, it is the department's biggest fundraising event each year, bringing in roughly \$7,000 each Independence Day.

"The raffle pays for a lot of emergency support.

Rheingans said that wouldn't be an issue.

As far as the capacity of the pool is concerned, at the time of the meeting, most of the State of the Iowa's rules were limited to 50% of the capacity of buildings and businesses. That limit has since been lifted as well.

However, recommendations for pools were to divide the square footage of the area outside of the water so that people could maintain six feet distance, and use that to determine the number allowed in. Rheingans noted that would mean less than half of the pool's capacity would be allowed at any one time, regardless of state limits.

Those buying passes to the pool would likely be asked to sign waivers, acknowledging that anyone using the pool was doing so at their own risk of exposure to COVID-19.

Rheingans noted that, based on public health guidelines, if any swimmer tests positive, all others swimming at the same time may have to be contacted about potential exposure. She said that the City may need to collect contact information of each day's swimmers.

Rheingans added that, if a lifeguard were to test positive, they would have to quarantine, and everyone that worked with them on a shift would as well.

That brought her to another issue, a lack of certified lifeguards. With the shutdowns, it had been difficult to find teachers to get additional lifeguards the lessons needed. She said that there are 15 lifeguards currently available.

With that in mind, if a lifeguard were diag-

nosed, the six guards sharing their shift would also be out for 14 days, making it difficult to remain fully staffed every day.

Council member Dan Reeder suggested that she could hire lifeguards from communities where pools had closed for the season.

Rheingans also noted that lifeguard duties are to watch the water, and so additional staff may be needed to supervise COVID-19 cleaning and social distance guidelines.

Rheingans was asked how comfortable she was opening the pool.

She said that, as a parent, she wants her children to have a chance to have fun at the pool. But, as a nurse (Rheingans works as Northwood-Kensett's district nurse during the school year), she was worried about the potential for infection. "I'm at about 50% comfortable with it," Rheingans said. She added that ultimately, it wasn't her decision and that she would make it work if the council wants to open the pool. She said she wouldn't do it halfway, and would work with CDC guidance.

Reeder said that he thinks the City needs the pool, to give something for kids to do. He said that he was worried about the pools being placed in yards in the city, and potential dangers.

Reeder also said that he wanted to open it to local residents who bought passes for the season, to help mitigate worries of swimmers coming from areas with closed pools.

Other council members agreed with that option, but worried

about families that purchase passes and can't use the pool when it reaches capacity early in the day.

Council member Gary Nerlien said that he wants to open the pool if it can be done safely. But, if the pool can't open safely, it would only be for one year.

Council member Russ Meyer said that he wants to see the pool open as well, but that if Rheingans and city superintendent Dirk VanRyswyk aren't comfortable with how that would work, the council needs to support them.

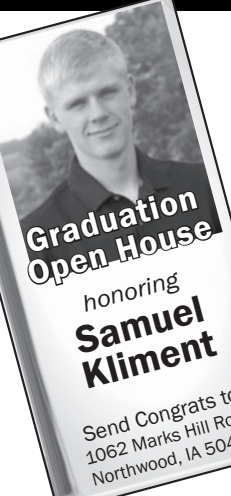
The council asked VanRyswyk to begin preparing the pool, in case it will be used. He said that would take about 10 days, meaning the soonest it could open would be June 17, assuming opening was allowed by the State, or that the City wanted to allow lap swimming and lessons.

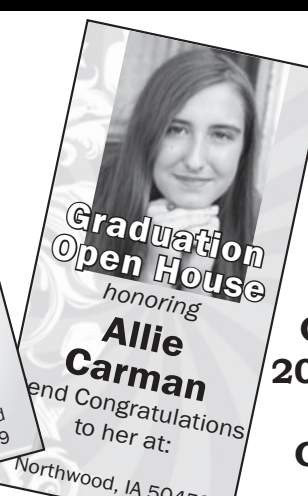
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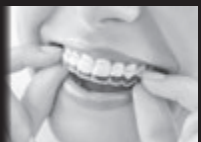
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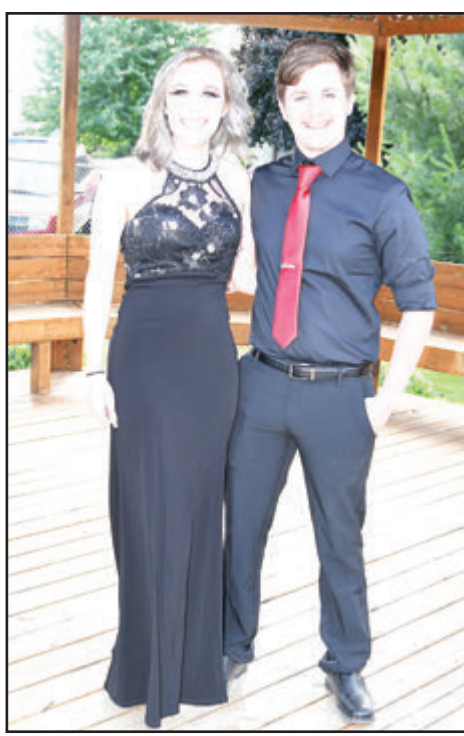

University of Iowa announces 2020 spring semester dean's list honorees

More than 8,500 undergraduate students at the University of Iowa were named to the dean's list for the 2020 spring semester.

Capacity limits lifted as pools, senior centers open

On June 10, Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds announced the latest measure that extended business openings, removed capacity restrictions and allowed remaining closed businesses and facilities to reopen.

The governor's latest proclamation began on June 12 and continues through Thursday, June 25.

In the proclamation, Reynolds lifted the restriction that businesses, clubs and other

gathering places could only operate at 50% capacity. This applies to retail, restaurants, casinos, movie theatres, social clubs and all other places where the capacity limits were in place.

All places of business must still operate so that social distancing guidelines are observed, meaning restaurants and theatres must place six feet distance between seating and stores have to ensure six feet of dis-

tance between customers and employees, for example.

Also removed from the most recent proclamation was language that prohibited restaurants, social clubs and other food-service establishments from offering self-service and buffets.

Limits on pools were also lifted in the proclamation. Previously pools were only allowed to offer lap swimming and swimming lessons. That restriction is no

longer in place, effective June 12.

Other gathering places that had been closed will be allowed to open on Friday. This includes senior centers and adult day cares, live theatre venues and indoor playgrounds.

All the newly opened and more broadly opened businesses and gathering places must operate to ensure social distancing, stepped up hygiene practice and compliance with public health guidelines.

Iowa State Fair postponed to 2021

The Iowa State Fair Board, the governing body who oversees the Iowa State Fair, voted last week to postpone the 2020 Iowa State Fair until August 12-22, 2021, amid ongoing coronavirus (COVID-19) concerns. The decision was made to protect the health and safety of all fairgoers.

"After a thorough review of possible options, while carefully reviewing current health guidelines and examining operating limitations, it became clear that holding the 2020 Iowa State Fair, which attracts approximately one million people over 11 days, would not be responsible."

"The top priority of the Iowa State Fair has and always will be to protect the health and safety of fairgoers. While the decision of the Iowa State Fair Board will certainly come as a disappointment to many, the Board determined that holding a Fair in accordance with current health guidelines related to COVID-19 wasn't

feasible," said Iowa State Fair Manager and CEO Gary Slater. "We appreciate the support of Fairgoers over the past few months as we've reviewed various options for the 2020 Iowa State Fair. We certainly look forward to welcoming over one million people back to the Fair in 2021."

The Iowa State Fair had been scheduled for August 13-23, 2020. The Iowa State Fair Board delayed a decision as

long as possible and believed it was important to make a decision on the Fair now in order to give concessionaires, vendors and Fairgoers planning a trip to the Fair ample notice.

Iowa State Fair staff and management have already begun the process of booking entertainment and planning for the 2021 Iowa State Fair scheduled for August 12-22.

According to the Iowa State Fair website,

alternatives are being looked at for 4-H projects. Some will be allowed to submit in 2021. Alternatives are being investigated for livestock entries.

Anyone purchasing advanced tickets may be eligible for a refund, to carry over their ticket to next year's Iowa State Fair or to donate funds to the fair.

"We understand this difficult decision was made to protect the health of everyone, including our youth and families," said Debbie Nistler, Iowa 4-H state program leader. "We thank the Iowa State Fair Board for their

continued support and look forward to continuing to partner with them for many years to come."

4-H staff are currently working with the Iowa State Fair Board on opportunities for youth exhibits and shows and will be releasing more information in the coming weeks.

"4-H gives youth the opportunity to feel physically and emotion-

ally safe while actively engaging in activities," said Nistler. "This year, safety is especially important to consider as we implement our positive youth development programs."

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FLC holding outdoor services

First Lutheran Church in Northwood announced last week that worship services would move from remote options to outdoor services, beginning this past Sunday.

A letter to members of the congregation announced that the church had moved to phase two of its

reopening plan. Phase one had continued online worship services, with some additional use of the church for other events and rituals, while limiting the size of groups and taking certain precautions.

In phase two, worship services will be held outside, weather permitting. When the service is held outdoors,

members of the congregation will be asked to bring lawn chairs and wear masks. They will be seated by ushers, who will place people with social distancing in mind.

Anyone that is feeling ill or who is at risk for severe COVID-19 complications is asked to stay home. Worship services will continue to

be offered online as well.

More information, including information on whether a weekly service will be held outside or solely online, will be shared on local TV and radio stations, the church's Facebook page and the church's website, www.flcnorthwood.org.

DOE provides summer sports transportation guidance

The Iowa Department of Education (DOE) has released guidance for how Iowa school districts will safely transport student athletes during the summer sports season.

According to the DOE guidance, players and coaches should have their temperatures checked at home before they begin any travel. Those with temperatures above 100.3 degrees should not go to games.

Players should also be screened for COVID-19 symptoms, per the most recent CDC guidelines, which includes fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting and diarrhea.

Those that are sick or that have been in contact with a sick person or someone con-

firmed to have COVID-19 should not be in group settings.

Drivers with symptoms are told to notify supervisors and stay home.

The DOE guidance also notes that in many cases Iowa's school bus drivers may be in at-risk groups for COVID-19. With that in mind, it is encouraged that drivers be the last one to board and first one to get off the bus, to minimize contact as students and coaches board and exit buses. The seat behind the driver is also to remain unoccupied.

Besides the order for the driver to exit and enter the bus, it is also noted that students should load from the back of the bus forward and exist from the front of the bus back.

Transportation staff should be trained in how to effectively clean buses in between uses, making sure that "high-touch" surfaces, like hand rails, seats, seat-

belts, door handles, etc., are cleaned thoroughly.

Those on trips are encouraged to increase the circulation of outdoor air into the vehicle as much as possible.

Food and drink containers should not be allowed on buses or school vehicles.

All those entering a vehicle should be encouraged to wash their hands or use hand sanitizer beforehand.

Social distancing will impact the number of students on a bus, as well as how they can be seated. According to Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines, athletes and coaches should sit one per seat, in every other seat, in alternating rows on buses.

The DOE gives an example that, under the guidance, a 77-passenger bus would only be able to transport 13 socially-distanced students.

The DOE guidance says that, when that is

not possible, students should be asked to wear masks, siblings and those in the same households should share seats, students should sit in the same seat going to and from a game and whenever possible students should be encouraged to ride with family.

I have been part of community cookbook projects several times but the first was in 1980. I was working at the Otsego County Mental Health Clinic in Oneonta, New York and we did a fund raising cookbook. This type of undertaking is very time consuming but great fun for anyone who enjoys cooking and seeing what the favorite of their friends and neighbors might be. "Otsego County Cooks" was published for us by Women's Club Publishing Co, Inc. in Chicago. The following are some submissions by my co-workers as well as one of my favorites too.

Carolyn Battista's Stuffed Mushrooms

24 large white mushrooms
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
4 tablespoons grated Romano
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
4 tablespoons dry bread crumbs
Dash of black pepper
White wine
3 tablespoons real butter

Wash the mushrooms quickly or wipe with a wet paper towel so they don't get soggy. Remove the stems close to the cap and chop them finely. Gently scoop out a bit of the pleated area in the middle of the cap to form a hollow. Melt the butter in a heavy skillet and sauté the onions and chopped stems for about 5 minutes over medium-low heat. Add the rest of the ingredients except the wine and stir to blend. Add about 1/3 cup of wine (or more if it looks dry) and combine. Put the mushroom caps into a baking dish and fill each cap with the stuffing mixture. Add 1/2 cup wine and 1/4 cup water to the pan but not so much that the stuffing gets wet. NOTE: you can use chicken stock instead of wine in this recipe. Add a pat of butter to the pan too. Bake at 325 degrees F. for 20 minutes or until the mushrooms are cooked through. Serve warm, not hot.

Doris Markel's Spanish Rice Meatballs

1 cup raw white rice
1 pound lean ground beef
1/2 cup tomato juice
1 egg, slightly beaten
2 teaspoons grated onion
1/2 teaspoon sugar
2 cans (8 oz.) tomato sauce
1 teaspoon black pepper
2 teaspoons kosher salt
1/8 teaspoon marjoram

Combine the ground beef, rice, egg, onion, spices and tomato juice. Form this mixture into about 18 meatballs. Pour the tomato sauce into

a large heavy skillet and place the meatballs on top of the sauce. Bring to a boil over medium heat. Reduce the heat and simmer about 15 minutes. Cover the pan and simmer until the rice is cooked through, basting occasionally. NOTE: add a little beef broth if the sauce starts to get too thick or begins to stick.

Bryna Silber's Cheesecake (My Favorite)

3 packages (8 oz.) Philadelphia Brand ® cream cheese, softened
NOTE: you can't use store-brand or less expensive cream cheese in this recipe; it won't be creamy enough.

4 eggs at room temperature
1 teaspoon real vanilla
1/3 cup milk or half and half
1 cup sugar

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Cream the cheese. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well between additions. Add the sugar, milk and vanilla and combine well. Pour into a 9-inch springform pan that has a graham cracker crust in it. NOTE: instructions for crust are on the graham cracker box. Bake the cake for 45 minutes, turn off the oven but leave the cake undisturbed for another 20 minutes. It make develop a crack on top; this is okay as it will be covered with topping.

Remove from the oven and let cool for 20 minutes before finishing.

Topping:

1 pint real sour cream, not low-fat or non-fat
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon real vanilla

Reheat the oven to 475 degrees F. (yes, 475!) Combine the topping ingredients stirring well. Spread this mixture on the warm cake and bake for 10 minutes at the high temperature. Remove from the oven and cool. The cake can be served the same day but is much better if allowed to sit overnight in the refrigerator to become more dense. You can serve with a berry sauce, canned cherry or strawberry pie filling or just as it is...your choice. It's a rich dessert that will serve about 10-12 people.

As I've mentioned many times, community cookbooks are the very best in my opinion. The dishes are tried and true and are always the cooks' best efforts. No one wants his/her name on a less than stellar recipe. There are usually no strange or exotic ingredients that can't be found locally and no long list of instructions. And, the author of the recipes can often be found in case there are questions. What's not to like? And...that's all she wrote.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

From January 1987 to September 1999 I worked as a psychotherapist at the Mental Health Center of North Iowa. At that time, this private, non-profit agency provided outpatient mental health care for 10 counties, Worth County being one of them. While the main office was located in Mason City, the Center provided therapists to travel to the other nine counties so their residents would have access to services without traveling long distances from home. Part of my job was to operate the satellite offices in Worth, Hancock and Franklin counties, each one day a week. The Mental Health Center has since closed its doors and the staff either retired or scattered to other outpatient service providers.

When I read Erin McCord's article on Worth County joining several other counties as part of the Northwest Iowa Care Connections, my first thought was where will clients who live in our county receive their outpatient services: psychotherapy, nurse visits, appointments with a psychiatrist and medication reviews/refills?

In the article that appeared in the June 2 edition of the Anchor, it stated that Barry Anderson of Clay County, who is chair of the NWIACC (North West Iowa Care Connections), welcomed new partners in Kossuth, Winnebago and Worth counties but he clearly stated, "..... no new treatment centers will be opened in the incoming counties" and that "NWIACC will be working on developing relationships with local providers in order to contract for services." This all sounds well and good but my question is where and who ARE those "local providers"? I would like a response from Mr. Abrams or other Worth County supervisors regarding the convenient accessibility of services for those in our county who depend upon mental health services. In this particular time of stress, loneliness and vulnerability due to COVID-19, there is no doubt that people who have not before needed counseling and/or medication might benefit from it now. Having life as we know it turned upside down is a concern for all of us and more so for those who have added stressors of financial worry, kids that need to be educated and jobs that have disappeared. And, of course, there are people who are living with serious and persistent mental illness and who require regular support to remain out of the hospital and enjoying their own homes. Do they need to travel distances to find that support?

Since I worked in the field for years, I still occasionally get a question from someone regarding who or where I would recommend a person find someone to talk to about depression, anxiety, marital problems, family issues, and more. When this does happen, I don't know of any resources other than MercyOne (if one has resources or good insurance) and a couple of private clinicians in Mason City. So, Supervisors, with this new affiliation with NWIACC, who are "working on contracting for service", what should my response be if asked? Thank you for any clarification you can provide since you have indicated Worth County will be receiving "better, more cost-effective services now". I would greatly appreciate your response in the Anchor so others who are interested will have the necessary information.

Nature notes

The foam serves a number of purposes: Protecting the nymph from predators as well as providing the tender nymph with insulation from temperature extremes and low humidity.

Fit to print...

It was the day after my sixth birthday I learned everyone isn't white. That's the day I first saw a black person, a woman who cleaned the underground bathrooms at Central Park in Mason City. I was afraid of the bathroom's dark tile walls, its slippery floors, and I was afraid of her.

"That woman was black!" I later said to my mother. "Does God make people with black skin?" She said she didn't know, and it was obvious from the look on her face she didn't care.

After that when I was being bad, Mom would threaten another visit to those bathrooms saying I'd better watch out or she would leave me there with that black woman.

In her defense, if there was a defense, Mom had also been born into a white Iowa farm family. Growing up two miles south of Scarville, all she knew was men in overalls, teams of horses and the Norwegian Lutheran Church. From a little girl on, she feared people of color and tried to transmit that fear to me.

It didn't work.

I am blessed to have an international family. My sister-in-law Lillian is Puerto Rican. My daughter-in-law Almira was born in the Philippines. My grandson Henry is Philippine-American, and my daughter Laurie was born in Seoul, South Korea.

This story is about being Laurie's mom.

Most of you know about the kind policeman who found her abandoned in the woods one winter and how we adopted her as an infant.

Fast-forward three years. Living at that time near Mount

Rushmore in South Dakota, we had many visitors. This particular day I had volunteered to take a Vietnamese family to see the famous monument.

Thinking that my three-year-old might enjoy playing with other kids more than going to see Mount Rushmore for the umpteenth time, I took her to the house of a daycare provider for the afternoon.

The woman met us at the door, a little three-year-old boy at her side. The boy took one look at Laurie and said, "You dumb Chinese!"

My heart sank. What kind of afternoon would my little girl have? How did a three-year-old child learn to be so cruel?

The Vietnamese family I drove to Mount Rushmore seemed to enjoy seeing all the presidents' faces, but I couldn't wait to get back to my daughter.

"Did you have fun with the kids this afternoon?" I later asked. "Yes, Mama, I did," she smiled. "One of the boys called me a dumb Chinese, but I told him I was Korean."

At three years old, Laurie had already begun handling racial prejudice. Years of name-calling and being left out of things at school taught her to build a hard crust around her soft heart. But when she felt safe in the arms of people who loved her, the crust crumbled into tears.

A Mom's Story



I particularly remember one afternoon when 16-year-old Laurie and I were shopping at Macy's. We were a couple of aisles apart when I heard the words, "Mom, would you come over here, please?"

Glancing in Laurie's direction I saw a clerk closely following her. Seeing me, the woman turned away, her glaring look turning to embarrassment.

My daughter has grown into a young woman, as beautiful on the outside as she is on the inside. A Luther College grad, she is now employed at Harvard Law School in Boston, Massachusetts. Earlier this year she received the Dean's Award for Excellence, translating text into braille for blind students. She and her husband Jim have two golden retrievers.

Thank God for creating people in different colors. How boring it would be to live in an all white world.

Prejudice in all its forms is heartbreaking. Thankfully, in the story I have just shared with you, it has not broken my daughter's beautiful spirit.

After going 14-14 last year, still young Vikings want even more in 2020

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic still raging in many parts of the country, including Iowa, the boys of summer began practice two weeks ago and by the time you've read this preview they will have played their first games of the 2019-20 baseball season.

With the pandemic still on the players' minds and social distancing rules being applied to everything possible at practice, one could wonder if it would be hard to think about winning or losing this year, but not for this Vikings team.

"It feels really good to be back doing what we love," said Vikings ace Ethian Tasker. "Not just because we're getting to play again, but this team, even though it's going to be a short season, has a lot we want to accomplish."

With its 14-14 record a year ago Northwood-Kensett head coach Jeff Ferstein ran his four-



year record to 36-68, a great improvement for a program that had went 15-139 in the previous six years before his arrival at N-K.

But despite last year's success, Ferstein knows this team has much more to prove. And even though this will be his final season at the helm of the program he has resurrected, Ferstein gives all the credit to his young players.

"It's all been different this summer for sure, like when there was lightning at practice but we're not allowed in the dugouts yet," said the fifth-year skipper after practice one day last week.

"This season is going to all come down to our guys and how bad they

want it and how much they're able to put all these distractions behind them. From what I've seen I've been pleasantly surprised, they came ready to play and physically in shape, it shows me how bad they want this to be their year."

The Vikings did lose a lot of offense and a very capable backstop in Gavin Varner from last year, who led the team with 36 hits and a .414 batting average after playing in all 28 games.

But that production, as great as it was, will be offset by junior Cade Hengesteg, who, along with Varner, was the only other player to play in all 28 games. Hengesteg's numbers were nearly identical. He had 28 hits, a .359 average, two HRs, and 26 RBIs.

The Vikings will be equally as strong on the hill as well with the return of two of their top hurlers from last season.

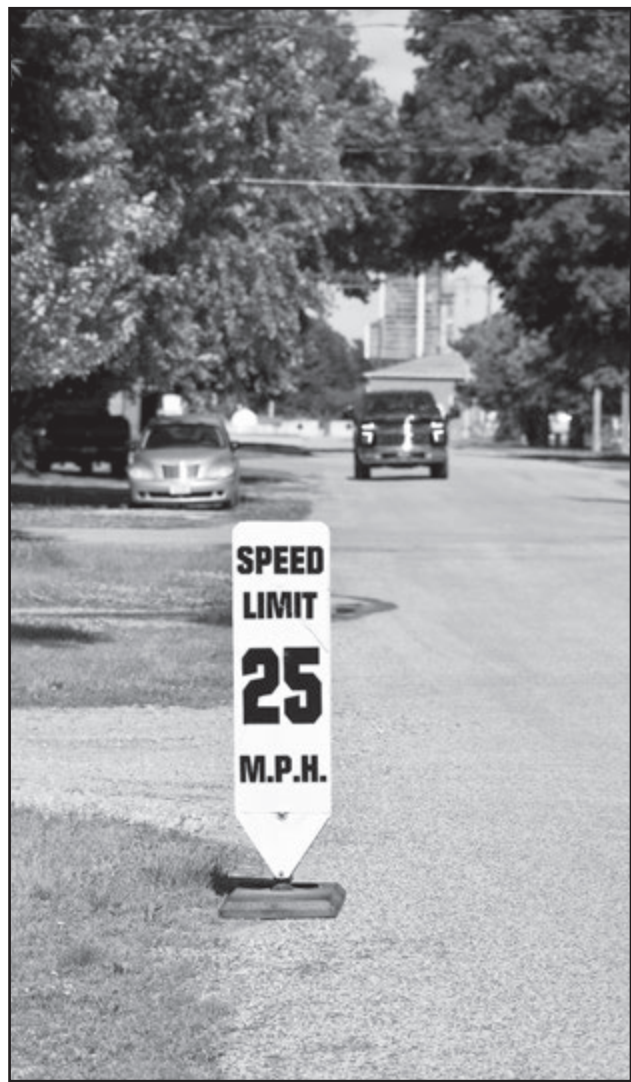
Tasker was tops last season with a 5-1 record

in 46 innings pitched and led the team with 63 Ks to go along with a very respectable ERA (2.89) and WHIP (1.22).

Junior Isaac Renteria, while not getting the innings that Tasker did, pitched only 16 innings but came up with even more impressive numbers, going 3-2 with an incredible 1.73 ERA and a 1.65 WHIP.

When you add it all up, this Vikings team could be the best we've seen coming out of N-K in a decade or more. The team opened its season on Monday in Allison against Top of Iowa Conference East rival North Butler.
